

PLAIN SAILING FOR LISBON

Latest statistics show cruise tourism goes from strength to strength







2nd September 2015 – Lisbon's cruise sector is gearing up for a bumper year, after recording a nine per cent increase in cruise passengers during the first half of 2015, up to 193,938 compared to 177,185 during the same period last year. A long established cruise destination, Europe's westernmost capital typically welcomes more than half a million cruise visitors each year.

Lisbon scored the impressive dual distinction at the most recent World Travel Awards, the so-called 'Oscars of the Tourism Industry', of being selected as both 'Europe's Leading Cruise Destination' and 'Europe's Leading Cruise Port'.

More than 40 cruise lines are scheduled to call at the Port of Lisbon in 2015. Located between the River Tagus and the Atlantic Ocean, the natural harbour is able to accommodate all kinds of cruise ships, from the smallest to the largest, with a new terminal, designed by acclaimed architect Carrilho da Graça, set to open in 2016.

Although a number of cruise ships offer a shuttle service to Praça do Comércio, the heart of the city, the port's proximity to the historical and cultural centre of the Portuguese capital allows visitors to reach independently, quickly and easily many of of Lisbon's tourist highlights and must-visit neighbourhoods, such as Baixa-Chiado, Belém, Bairro Alto and Cais do Sodré.

For a truly memorable Lisbon experience, visitors who only have a few hours in the city should try one of the following:

- Hop on the No 28 tram for a nostalgic way to get an overview of the city its 40-minute sloping journey covers many of Lisbon's key sights
- Climb the majestic Arco da Rua Augusta and enjoy the bird's-eye views from the top
- See how the Lisbon Story Centre brings the city's long and celebrated history to life through a 60-minute multimedia tour
- Explore the UNESCO World Heritage Sites at Belém, the Mosteiro dos Jerónimos and the Torre de Belém, both built in the 1500s
- Follow a series of walkways, viewpoints and gardens hidden within the old Moorish walls of the San Jorge Castle



- Have lunch at one of the many outdoor cafés and eateries in Terreiro do Paço, next to the River Tagus
- Discover Bairro Alto with its multitude of alternative shops, second-hand clothes stores, record stores and art galleries
- Find out why the traffic-free Pink Street in Cais do Sodré is fast becoming the new focus of Lisbon's party scene
