

THOUSANDS OF WINTERING WADERS AND WATERFOWL FLOCK TO LISBON

Birdwatchers rejoice as Lisbon prepares for the annual bird migration







24 October 2017 – In November, Lisbon will become a birdwatchers' paradise when thousands of waterbirds migrate to the Tagus estuary, Portugal's largest wetland and one of the most important in Europe. Every year, over 120,000 waders, waterfowl and other aquatic birds from northern Europe arrive to enjoy the mild climate along the tranquil mouth of the Tagus River, some resting before continuing south and others staying throughout the winter.

Among the autumn visitors are thousands of Greater Flamingos, making a stunning spectacle, but these are not the only guests, with herons, stilts, geese and many others all arriving during this period. And while November through to January are the best months to spot migrating birds, an area bird list that includes over 250 species makes this a year-round destination for bird lovers.

Covering over 14,000 hectares and less than half an hour's drive from the centre of Lisbon, the Tagus estuary is also a nature reserve aimed at protecting wintering and breeding populations of aquatic birds. A good starting point for visitors is a trip to the <u>EVOA</u> − the Tagus Estuary Birdwatching and Conservation Area - with hidden trails and hides that are strategically located for birdwatching, and a visitor centre with exhibitions and interactive learning activities. Entry is €12 per person and includes a guided birdwatching tour and access to the latest exhibition.

Visitors can enjoy birdwatching as a specialist short break or even as a day trip, during a city stay. There are several companies devoted to offering specialist birdwatching excursions, including:

 <u>Birds & Nature Tours</u> has half day (morning or afternoon) and full day guided tours of the Tagus estuary, which are available for €100 (half day) and €150 (full day) per person. The company also offers a 5-day itinerary, including guide fees, field guides, ground transport,



full programme of birdwatching at two wetlands, airport transfers and hotel accommodation, starting from €1,290 per person, based on two people sharing a room.

• Estrela D'alva Tours offer a unique perspective on birdwatching with water rides on board their river boat Rio-a-Dentro, which takes guests on a three to four-hour journey navigating the many intricate creeks and estuaries of the Tagus. Prices start from €95 per person, including a professional guide.

The estuary is not the only place to spot birds in Lisbon. Gulls and pallid swifts can be spotted in the districts of Belém and the Parque das Nações and from Cais do Sodré, one of the city's trendiest suburbs, large flocks of common starlings arrive and roost in the trees around the railway station.
